A MESSAGE FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Caregivers

When writing the newsletter each fortnight, I spend time contemplating what is happening in our school that impacts on students, staff and parents. One of the big issues currently is the state of education in New Zealand. While the 'issues' can not always been seen, they are real and taking a huge toll on staff and students.

The concerns continue to be resourcing, release and pay. I feel compelled to explain the concerns we have with the current offer from the Government in settling our collective agreements - both Teachers and Principals. The information being provided by the media is often incorrect and at times misleading. and the Government is refusing to negotiate in good faith, entering discussions with a pre-determined outcome already decided.

Some of the issues that remain for us are:

- Primary teachers get 1 hour a week release time. Secondary teachers get 5 hours a week. This is not fair.
- Our Primary collective agreements expired on the 8th of June 2018. The Government is refusing to back pay us if/when an agreement is reached.
- The Government offered primary teachers a \$500 bonus to sign the agreement. They offered secondary teachers \$1000. This is not fair.
- The Government is refusing to commit to pay parity, meaning secondary teachers will be paid more for the same qualifications and responsibilities as primary teachers. Teachers should be paid the same for equal qualifications – regardless of the age of the students.

The minister talks about a ten thousand dollar pay rise - but it is not \$10,000 in the hand to every teacher on every pay grade straight away; it is an incremental increase over three years. Currently our beginning teachers spend a minimum of 3 years at university and then start on \$47,980. This offer gives them a 3% increase straight away - \$19 a week. Experienced teachers stand to get about \$27 a week from this offer. Even if we accepted the \$27 a week, teachers have already lost somewhere in the vicinity of \$2000 over the last year through this negotiation – both through unpaid strike days and the lack of an existing contract. So in fact - if we signed today, it would take over a year for us to even make up what we've lost.

The support for learners with special needs – both learning and behaviour – is not acceptable. Children with additional needs require specially designed programmes and resources, and these take time to prepare and implement. Limited release for primary teachers means they have no extra time to plan for these learners, attend meetings or support whanau, and so this is being done in weekends and eveninas.

Despite the media commentary, we are not being unreasonable or greedy - the things we are asking for are central to our ability to provide a quality education for the children in our schools. The reality of a staff shortage is hitting our schools hard – we struggle to get teachers to choose and then stay in the profession. At GIS we have been fortunate so far, but for how much longer?

If we fail to get a fair and equitable outcome from these negotiations, we will have to wait another 3 years to address our concerns, and I am not sure what will be left of our education system.

If you have concerns about the way the negotiations are being handled by the Government and manipulated by the media, then please make contact with your local MP, the Minister of Education or the Prime Minister. If you ask them a question they are required to provide you with an answer.

Students in a class with someone who has measles may be asked to stay home for one to two weeks, if they have had no MMR vaccinations.

Students with one or more MMR vaccinations can still attend school.

Check your child's immunisation records in their Well Child/Tamariki Ora book or ring your GP clinic.

Tell your GP or after hours clinic if you suspect measles before you arrive, so you don't infect others.
