Message from Mrs Stevenson and Mrs Syddall

Kia ora koutou

Last term our students took part in the NZCER Student Wellbeing Survey. This survey was completed by all the schools in our Kāhui Ako. The data is helping us look at trends and patterns across our cluster of schools and even more importantly look at how students are feeling. Below are some of the positive aspects students have identified as strengths here at GIS.

School-wide climate and practices

- ➤ Teachers and students care about each other 93%
- > Behaviours like hitting or bullying are not OK at school 96%

 \succ At school, we are encouraged to get on with students from different cultures 94%

➤ Teachers get on well with students from different cultures and backgrounds 96%

Community partnerships

- > My parents, family and whanau always feel welcome at school 96%
- ➤ My parents and teachers respect each other 98%

We will now be focusing on key areas for development within classrooms and making connections with our PC4L and Mitey lessons. We are also starting a student Hauora group to get student voice and hear their valuable ideas and contributions.

Kia ora koutou

Our learner profile focus for the next couple of weeks is working collaboratively with others. Effective collaboration requires a lot from our learners. Developing the right skills can help collaboration thrive. Here are four key skills that support collaboration and some ways we can all work together.

- 1. Open- mindedness: one of the most important aspects of collaborating is being open to and accepting of new ideas. What conversations can we model for our adolescents that demonstrates this?
- 2. Effective communication: this includes the important skill of active listening. Encouraging adolescents to paraphrase and revoice helps them practice this skill.
- 3. Adaptability: the dynamic nature of collaboration often means that plans change. Being adaptable is something that comes with practice rather than a strategy that is taught. How can we provide our adolescents with opportunities where they practice managing the emotions (often frustration or anxiety) that sometimes comes with change?
- 4. Debating: this is often a skill that adolescents confuse with arguing. The key differences between the two is that you go into a debate prepared to have your mind changed on the basis of strong evidence. A debate is always: on point, productive, and respectful. How can we provide opportunities for discussions and debates that require our adolescents to respectfully discuss issues that are important to them?

Reinfection advice

The Ministry of Health updated its advice on getting infected again with COVID-19 within 90 days of a previous COVID-19 infection in light of increasing evidence that re infections can occur earlier than 90 days. The latest evidence shows that getting COVID-19 again within a short period of time can happen – but it's unclear how common it is. Reinfection is also more likely as new variants spread among the community.

You are more likely to become reinfected as your immune response from the vaccine or your previous COVID-19 infection decreases over time.

If it is 28 days or fewer since the last infection, there's no need to test.

Within 28 days, symptoms are most likely due to lasting effects of the initial infection or a different new respiratory infection. A new COVID-19 infection is difficult to diagnose within 28 days because symptoms, viral levels and test positivity may fluctuate during this time.

COVID-19-like symptoms may well be caused by other infections like the common cold, flu or a chest infection.

If a person develops new COVID-19 symptoms, and it's 29 days or more since their previous infection, it's possible that it's a reinfection with COVID-19 and they should take a rapid antigen test. If that test is positive, they will need to isolate for a second time for seven days.

For most people, illness caused by reinfection is likely to be no more severe than a first infection, but they can experience different symptoms.

If a person is not getting better, or becoming increasingly unwell, they should call Healthline on 0800 358 5453 or their doctor/healthcare provider.

Evidence on reinfections is evolving rapidly. The Ministry of Health is constantly monitoring what's happening internationally and updating their guidance to ensure it is in line with the latest public health advice.
