Maths at GIS

Our context of Here, There and Everywhere for this term lends itself well to teaching statistics. Learning about statistics can help children develop critical thinking skills, as they learn to analyze data and draw conclusions based on evidence. In addition, it can help them become better informed consumers, voters, and citizens, as they learn to interpret and evaluate information presented in the media and in everyday life.

Some of the basic mathematical skills needed to progress in statistics are multiplication and division, and an understanding of fractions, decimals and percentages. We will continue to work on these skills in class, however time is limited so please encourage your child practice these at home. Knowing how to multiply and divide by 10, 100 and 1000 is useful when calculating percentages and something that can easily be practised at home.

We have over 50 students participating in the Otago Problem Solving challenge this year. These are a series of problems that the students complete over the next two terms. Congratulations to Jovana, Kimoon, Isaac, Emilie, Michael, and Phoebe for achieving 100% in the first round.

In week 7 of this term, the interschool Mathex competition will be held at Northcross Intermediate. Our budding mathematicians have been practising problems each week in preparation. 




Environmental Group

- how to manage their time to get important work completed.

Children demonstrate Mana Motuhake when they:

- feel proud to be a member of their cultural group.
- come to school regularly, on time and ready to learn.
- communicate with clarity and confidence.
- set goals and complete tasks to the best of their ability.
- use creativity and imagination to problem-solve and innovate
